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In addition to the jurisdiction and powers assigned in this Chapter, a district court judge has the following powers:

- To administer oaths;
- To punish for contempt;
- To compel the attendance of witnesses and the production of evidence;
- To set bail;
- To issue arrest warrants valid throughout the State, and search warrants valid throughout the district of issue; and
- To issue all process and orders necessary or proper in the exercise of his powers and authority, and to effectuate his lawful judgments and decrees.

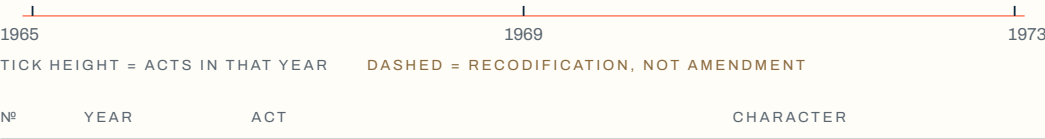
